KNOW THE FACTS BEFORE BREEDING YOUR DOG

We think it is extremely important to learn the facts and possible consequences in advance if you are contemplating breeding your Flatcoat. In today's overcrowded world we, the keepers of our Flatcoats, must make responsible decisions for them and for ourselves. The following points should be thought about carefully.

Quality - A K. C. registration is <u>not</u> an indication of quality. Most dogs, however bred, should not be bred from. Many Flatcoats, though wonderful pets, have defects of structure, personality or health that should not be perpetuated. Breeding animals should be free of known defects before starting on a reproductive career. Breeding should only be done with the goal of improvement - an honest attempt to produce puppies better than their parents. Ignorance (even in law) is no excuse. Once you have created a life, you cannot take it back, even if blind, crippled or a canine psychopath.

Cost - Dog breeding is not a money making proposition if done correctly. Health care and maintenance, proof of quality, extra food, facilities, stud fees, adverts, etc. are all expensive and most must be paid before the pups are sold. An unexpected caesarean or emergency care for an extra large litter or sick pup can soon turn into a big liability. And this is if you sell the pups.

Sales - First time breeders have no reputation to help them find buyers. Previous promises of 'I want a dog just like yours' soon evaporate. Consider the time and expense in caring for pups that may not sell until they are four months old, even older with males. What would you do if your pups did not sell? Send them to the local home or RSPCA? Dump them somewhere? Sell cheap to anyone who may sell onto labs or unsavoury buyers? Veteran breeders always have accommodation for older pups who linger past the puppy stage.

Joy of Birth - If you're doing it for the children's education, remember that the birth may be at 3 a.m. or at the vets on a surgery table. Even if the kids are present, they may see the birth of a monster, or mummy, or see the bitch scream and bite as you attempt to deliver a pup that is too big, or stuck half in and half out. Some bitches are not natural mothers and ignore or savage their pups. The bitch may not be able to look after her pups through infection, she may even die. Pups can be born dead - how long do you try to revive a pup, when and how do you euthanase a deformity? Flatcoats are easy whelpers and the joy of healthy pups with a contented bitch is fantastic, but if you cannot deal with the possibility of a tragedy, don't start.

Time - Breeders of quality dogs spend many hours a day with the bitch and young pups. The bitch cannot be left when whelping and needs to be watched very closely before whelping (who has spent 2 nights sitting up with a bitch thinking she might whelp) and after whelping to ensure she is O.K. and the pups are doing fine. Bottling at first is every 2 hours and it's not the feeding but the ablutions that take the time. As the pups get older, grooming, socialisation and cleaning take a lot of time. Paperwork, pedigrees and interviewing new owners also takes a lot of time. If you have abnormal pups, sick pups or an anti-social bitch, count on twice the time and, if you cannot provide it, you will have dead or poor pups that are bad tempered, anti-social, dirty or sickly - hardly a buyer's delight.

Humane responsibilities - It's midnight - do you know where your pups are? Thousands of dogs are put into "homes" or die unwanted through disease or starvation. Some of them are flatcoats with papers. Do you screen potential buyers carefully? Or will you just take the money and not worry if the pup is chained up all its life or let loose to run the streets? Will you turn down a sale to the wrong home? Or will you say yes and not think about the pup you held and loved now having a litter of pups (pure breed or mongrel) every time she comes in season, or a male mating every bitch he comes across. These are your grandpups. Would you be prepared to take a grown dog if the owners could no longer care for it? Or can you live with the thought that the baby you brought into the world will be put down because no-one wants it.

2ND OPEN SHOW HELD 4TH MAY 1997

The Association held its second open show early last month at Woodford Community Centre. Judging commenced promptly but unfortunately inside due to gathering rain clouds. Junior handling was held during the lunch break, judged by Alison Carroll. All the youngsters did very well and show a lot of promise for the future. After lunch, there appeared to be an improvement in the weather, so judging commenced for the bitches outside. A particularly heavy shower, however, very soon had everyone scurrying back under cover. Tips of the Tail

- When training a young dog, remember that the way to a dog's heart is through it's stomach. As praise for a task well done, give your puppy a small tasty morsel, hopefully he will remember more easily when next asked to repeat the routine.
- Ticks picked up by dogs can be a particular problem in spring and autumn. If not dealt with properly they can cause serious infections. Do not try to remove the tick by pulling it off the body. If the tick is completely covered with petroleum jelly, it will be unable to draw air in through its body and will drop off the dog on its own accord.
