#### GUIDELINES FOR THE LITTER RECORDING SERVICE

A reminder that our litter recorder is Mrs. Brenda Adams (tel. No. 01423 885471) whom we are sure is known to many of you. Please let her know if you are expecting a litter in order that she can put you on her list and help to match your puppies with new owners. The following points are general guidelines for using the service which we hope will be of use to breeders and those of you looking for a puppy alike.

- 1. Priority will be given to Members of the Association who have puppies available.
- 2. New owners should be given advice and support together with a copy of the Code of Ethics of the Association.
- 3. Vendors must undertake to make all reasonable enquiries regarding the prospective homes and their suitability. The Secretary or Committee Member cannot enquire indepth into each prospective home, they can only advise.
- 4. Vendors must realise that whilst the Association will help as much as possible it is unreasonable to expect puppies to be homed in large numbers on a regular basis. Vendors must make every effort to home puppies themselves, preferably not having litters until they have sufficient enquiries.

When a litter has been sold, please notify the Litter Recorder so that your name can be removed from the 'puppies available' list so preventing disappointment to prospective new owners.

Celtic Swing, 2nd Smith's Pendlewych Pedlar - 9mths and a big boy, well coated, good reach of neck and level topline with good bend of stifle. 3rd B. Mactavish Res. Pilling & Whitehead's Llecan Saxon Cl. 3 Junior Dog (10,1) - 1st Colson's Windyhollows Tumbling Ted (RBIS, Best liver) - 15mths liver, well muscled with good bone and nice tight feet. Typical head, good reach of neck, nice front, correct tailset and level topline on the move, moved with drive. 2<sup>n</sup> Whiting's Spenbeck Zazu - a happy boy, 16 mths old. Melting expression, dark eye, good reach of neck, nice front, good bend of stifle, moved well when settled. 3<sup>rd</sup> Miller's Dunctonwood Mr Softee for Keepersend, Res. Showell's Shierdale Power of Magic for Cleovine Cl. 4 Special Yearling Dog (9,1) - 1st Burroughs' Elmstock Midnight Legend at Rokaness - 19mths well coated with the trimmings. Good profile with racy outline, nicely moulded head and dark eye, good reach of neck and correct lay of shoulders, level topline on the move, well balanced. 2<sup>nd</sup> S. Zazu, 3<sup>rd</sup> Phillips' The Sorcerers Apprentice from Jaeva, Res. Eggington's Pajanbeck Prince of Thieves Cl. 5 Novice Dog (5,0) - 1st S. Zazu, 2nd P. Prince of Thieves - balanced dog, typical head, good reach of neck, nice front, good bone and tight feet, constantly wagging tail. 3<sup>rd</sup> Lewins' Torwood Mannerly, Res. Whittaker's Bramatha Hot Chocolate Cl. 6 Graduate Dog (12,1) - 1st Ladley's Eskmill Moonraker - Balanced dog with good bone. Dark eye, good reach of neck, well set shoulders, nice front, level topline held on the move, moved well. 2<sup>nd</sup> E. Midnight Legend at R., 3<sup>nd</sup> Ashcroft's Steeplehouse Gamekeeper, Res. Allen's Darillen's Wings of Song Cl. 7 Post Graduate Dog (9,3) - 1st Malkin's Steeplehouse Ashe - Balanced with racy profile, classic head with dark eye, good reach of neck. Nice front, good bone and tight feet, good bend of stifle. 2nd Moult's Capeldewi Merman - well coated, good reach of neck, good front, balanced dog with correct turn of stifle, lost out to 1 on movement on the day. 3 Mescus & Kitching's Clowbeck Sweeney Todd, Res. D. Wings of Song Cl. 8 Limit Dog (8,2) - 1st Geoghegan's Hightarn Rambler by Fenfleet - Lovely profile, hard condition, nice balance. Good reach of neck and lay of shoulders, good front, well boned with tight feet, moved true and correct tail carriage. 2nd Slack's Wizardwood Orlando - dark eye, dense coat and feathering, good front, nice tight feet. Good bend of stifle, level topline and correct tail carriage on the move. 3<sup>rd</sup> D. Wings of Song, Res. Churchard's Cleovine Water Wagtail Cl. 9 Open Dog (9,3) - 1st Townsend's Steeplehouse Chipper (BIS) - super dog in profile, so well balanced in good coat with trimmings, classic head, dark eye, good reach of neck, good lay of shoulders, well boned with tight feet, moved and showed well. 2nd Eggington's Riversflight Marling to

Pajanbeck - unfortunate to come up against 1 on the day, lovely head with gentle expression, dark eye. Good bone and nice tight feet, good bend of stifle, level topline with correct tailset. Racy outline. 3rd W. Orlando, Res. Hughes' Heronsflight Haste Cl. 10 Veteran Dog (4,2) - 1st Bellamy's Falconcliffe Pageant - 7½ yrs. Racy outline, dark eye, good reach of neck, good bend of stifle, level topline and good tail carriage on the move, moved with drive and enthusiasm. 2<sup>nd</sup> Whiting's Mirfield Maximillian of Spenbeck - 10½ yrs old, super coat very little trace of grey, nice head with dark eye, level topline with good tail carriage on the move. Cl. 11 Special Liver Dog (4,1) - 1<sup>st</sup> W. Tumbling Ted, 2<sup>nd</sup> Hargreaves' Wolfhill Touch of Guiness - well coated dog with good bone, tight feet and good bend of stifle, correct tailset and level topline on the move. 3rd B. Hot Chocolate

BITCHES - Judge - Mr. Chris Atkinson (Seganti) My thanks to NEFRA for the opportunity to judge bitches at your Open Show. The warm and friendly welcome from the Officials and committee continued throughout the day and what was most pleasing was the generous applause each and every class winner received from the ringside whether or not they agreed with the placings! Long may it continue.

I thought there were a good number of very promising youngsters on show. Unfortunately as in a number of breeds movement can be a problem and finding type with soundness at times was not easy. Judging is about compromising and it all made for a compelling and enjoyable day. Presentation was excellent.

Baiting - Yes it can help "show" your dog but please don't push your dog backwards thus stuffing the neck into the shoulders and thereby spoiling the lovely flowing outline of the Flatcoat.

It was a pleasure to judge jointly with Mrs Karen Joyce and we were in full agreement

with all the major awards. A satisfying end to a grand day. Thank you.

Cl. 12 - Minor Puppy Bitch (11,2) - 1<sup>st</sup> Jury's Bel Fire at Torwood - Very sound to go over with correct texture of coat. Pleased in head and eye, she has a lovely front assembly which gives her good extension, moves a touch close behind but has width in quarters and well set hocks and I am sure will strengthen with age. A most promising bitch which went on to BPIS. 2<sup>nd</sup> Collins' Wizardwood Celtic Chimes 3<sup>nd</sup> Branchalwood Niceilidh, Res. Thornton's Whittersbeck Aquarius Cl. 13 - Puppy Bitch (10,1) - 1st Bunting's Mossdew Black Satin - Gives a clean outline both standing and on the move covering her ground well. Nice amount of bone with tight feet. Needs to body up but is OK for age. A dark eye with correct shape gave a pleasing expression. Green's Verdant Mint Crisp, 3rd B. Niceilidh, Res. Green's Verdant Orange Cream Cl. 14 - Junior Bitch (13,2) Very close decision here, pleased to see they were litter sisters. The deciding factor being when stood Nymph spoiled her outline by insisting on bringing her quarters that little too far under. It did not affect her movement as both moved exceptionally well. 1st Donnelly's Eskmill Nemesis - Lovely headpiece, clean skull, flowing neckline through well laid shoulders, firm backline to super quarters and lashing tail. 2<sup>nd</sup> Matthews' Eskmill Nymph 3<sup>rd</sup> Colson's Windyhollows Nelly Moser, Res V. Mint Crisp Cl. 15 - Special Yearling Bitch (12,3) - 1<sup>st</sup> E. Nemesis 2<sup>nd</sup> Brook's Gayplume Pretty Smart of Culmquill 3<sup>rd</sup> Brooks' Steelriver Mystic Rythms of Castlerock, Res. Walker's Spenbeck Debutante

Cl.16 - Novice Bitch (9,2) - 1st E. Nymph, 2nd S. Mystic Rhythms of C. 3rd Eggington's Pajanbeck Born Free Res. Fox's Wistosa Sings the Blues Cl. 17 - Graduate Bitch (14,3) 1st Garnett's Riberot Black Vanilla A very sound and honest bitch, she is balanced all through with no exaggerations, well ribbed up with depth of body. Tail nicely off back and used correctly, she has good bone and feet. Gives a positive action and shown to advantage in a very mixed class (RBB) 2<sup>nd</sup> E. Nemesis 3<sup>rd</sup> Matthews' Eskmill Moondance Res. Watson's Rainy Days and Sundays Cl. 18 - Post Graduate Bitch (11,2) - 1st Watson's Here Comes the Rain Medium size, shows well, is nicely constructed throughout with a stylish outline. Her profile movement and front action coming towards is very good. She has well angulated quarters. I would prefer her more muscled up which I am sure would help her rear movement which was disappointing. Won the class on overall make and shape. 2<sup>nd</sup> Bunting's Mossdew Black Magic 3<sup>rd</sup> Walker's Biddick Black Pearl Res. Barnett's Steeplehouse Tess Cl. 19 - Limit Bitch (9,1) - 1st Brook's Gayplume Dream Along of Culmquill - Not yet fully mature but she is very much in proportion. Beautiful headpiece, clean cut with a dark almond eye set correctly giving a true expression. Good straight bone down to neat feet. Well ribbed with strength over loin. 2<sup>nd</sup> Colson's Windyhollows In the Mood 3<sup>nd</sup> Wells' Gilduffe Irish Mist Res. Rees' Verdant Treacle Toffee Cl. 20 - Open Bitch (9,4) -1st Colson's Windyhollows Gypsy Moth Shows and moves to advantage but the extra weight on her shoulders just pegged her back. I liked size and construction. Very pleasing in head and eye, definitely Flatcoat with quality bone, she is well bodied, has level backline and sound quarters. 2<sup>nd</sup> Showell's Shargleam Reflection of Cleovine 3<sup>rd</sup> Miller's Keepersend Oh So Smart, Res. Jubb's Shargleam Blue Teal Cl. 21 - Veteran Bitch (8,1) - 1st Watson's Torwood Bizzie Bee (BBIS) - She has a good action covering a lot of ground, getting hind legs well under body to drive off. Nothing to hide in construction. Prefer a slightly more almond shape to eye but she has a feminine headpiece and kind expression. Has forechest and clean lay of shoulder giving good length of neck. Well ribbed without being overdone, width in quarters with good angulation. Changed handler for the challenge and still showed well. 2<sup>nd</sup> V. Treacle Toffee, 3rd Colson's Windyhollows Mirage, Res. Carroll & Ryder's Wizardwood Stormy Water at Jaskar Cl. 22 - Special Liver Bitch (4,0) - 1st W. Nelly Moser - Third in a strong Junior class. Stands up on her toes, sound to go over, very good first and second thigh. Well coupled with good body proportions. 2<sup>nd</sup> Showell's Windyhollows Foxglove, 3<sup>rd</sup> Whittaker's Bramatha Beat the Blues Res. Long's Chewy's Chocolate Chip

Class 23 - Brace (judged jointly) - 1st Kennedy, 2nd Tate, 3rd Whittaker

Mrs Joyce and I were delighted to award BIS to Townsend's Steeplehouse Chipper, RBIS to the quality young liver dog of Colson's Windyhollows Tumbling Ted and BPIS Jury's Bel Fire at Torwood finishing a most enjoyable day in good company.

#### A LIMP WITH A HAPPY ENDING ...... Submitted by Mrs. S. Collins

In October 1997 Tilly, my then seven year old Flatcoat, developed a limp; it came on suddenly and, thinking she had pulled a muscle, we rested her for about a week. After a week and still limping we took her to the vets where he gave her steroids, told us to keep her on a lead and that if it hadn't improved after a while he would X-ray her leg and shoulder. Tilly ended up having two lots of X-rays, one in the November and again in March 1998 because although the steroids helped slightly we felt they were actually hiding the cause of the limp. The vet warned us that Tilly may have the dreaded bone cancer but nothing showed on any of the X-rays. It wasn't until we went on a NEFRA training day and asked Peter Forster if he would mind having a look at Tilly that I was given some hope that Tilly may be alright. She had a lot of muscle wastage and was limping badly, dropping on her right shoulder when she moved; Peter asked to see the X-rays and, after seeing them, offered to use acupuncture and laser treatment to try and help her. He also advised exercise, the opposite to what our vet had advised, so we started swimming her at a local equine swimming pool.

The acupuncture is incredible and we can't thank Audrey and Peter enough; Tilly started by having it once a week, then every fortnight, then once a month. She now goes when we feel she needs a top up. Peter warned us that it wasn't a miracle cure and the effect wouldn't be instant, but from early in her treatment it was obvious that Tilly was gaining a lot of relief. She goes into the room for the acupuncture off the lead and wagging her tail, greeting Peter like a long lost friend, she then stands still while the needles are inserted and has the laser treatment. After about twenty minutes Peter tests the needles to see if any of them are ready to come out, invariably Tilly 'keeps' some of the needles but they always come out an hour or so later (I always hope we never get stopped by the police on the way home with our porcupine dog).

She has normal exercise with the younger dogs and she was 10 in November. We always expect the worse when our dogs suddenly develop something wrong, but it needn't be so, Tilly's experience is definitely of 'a limp with a happy ending'.

Our Flatcoats......Mrs. Kate Perry

In 1971 we purchased our first Flatcoated Retriever, Jess, having fallen in love with them at a local agricultural show. At 12 weeks, Jess 'fell' into a large garden pond. I was alerted to this by my mother's shouts of 'Come quickly the pup's drowning'. Rushing to her rescue I found Jess calmly swimming round and round. It took 20 minutes to persuade her to leave her watery domain. Lesson 1 - Flatcoats love water. Water to Jess meant FUN!! She paddled in drinking lowls, puddles, buckets ... our kitchen was always awash. Jess 'buried' bones in the carpet, loved everything and everyone. Her zest for life could leave us breathless. Sadly she picked up a virus at 18 months and after 3 traumatic days of fits despite heavy sedation we said goodbye to our gentle Jess.

We were heart-broken and although we considered having another flatcoat the thought of replacing her was too painful. Over the years we became involved with a Rescue organisation and fostered a number of unwanted and abused dogs, two of which came to stay. When Candy died we thought we had become a one dog family. Our other dog, Peg, had been a singleton pup of a bitch we had fostered and we did not think that she would accept a puppy. However in July 1996 I spotted an advert. A phone call and a chat to the breeder, then a 'should we shouldn't we' discussion, leading to a 'let's just go and have a look' and the inevitable 9 week old black bundle being cuddled on the way home!

We had planned to be so organised. The reality was arriving home at 8.30p.m. to an unprepared home and an even more unprepared 10 year old Peg. 1 can still see her now as we introduced the puppy, very much the maiden aunt, hoping 'it' would go away again. The first 3 days were hectic. Cassie tried very hard to make friends with Peg. Peg avoided her as much as possible. Then it happened. Cass crept up to a sleeping Peg who opened one eye, sighed and let the pup cuddle up. A friendship was born. Peg rediscovered play. Surprisingly gentle despite her size, she allowed Cass to win most wrestling and tug matches. As Cass grew, Peg became her protector, warning off suspicious dogs with a low rumbling growl. Cass was her pup and no one was going to hurt her.

At 20 weeks, Cass picked up an enteritis bug. It had been a hectic day for me ending with the door bell ringing just as Cass deposited her tea on my foot! This was hastily cleaned up and a few minutes later all was calm again. Our visitor was greeted by an enthusiastic Cass who appeared to be fine until she threw up again 3 times in quick succession. Our visitor hatly departed!! Poor Cass, like all flatcoat pups she was full of life, confident in her ability to tackle anything with an almost overwhelming exuberance. Now she felt awful, she trembled partly with chill and partly with fear. We nursed her all night. Next day she was like a rag doll, listless not wanting to eat or drink. She was giving up. Inspiration led to my husband 'playing' with her soft toy. At first no response, then a flicker of interest and finally she was back with us, a little shaky but definitely better. The next couple of days she was like a dog possessed - she'd wasted a day and had to make up for it, everything was done at breakneck speed.

Cass is now 6 months old. Has she changed? Yes, a bundle of energy greets us every morning. A flurry of black fur, a wiggle and a never-still tail are our constant companions. The garden has been redesigned. We've found new homes for the goldfish and the frogs have departed for safer havens. Each day new 'treasures' are brought to us by a joyous Cass while Peg looks on with dismay. Flower pots (with or without plants), stones, sticks, flower heads delicately plucked from their stalks and of course wet, deliciously smelly pond weed! As I write this Cass is sleeping on the sofa -she knows she shouldn't and she's waiting to be moved, but life's about pushing rules to the limit and as a flatcoat that is something at which she really excels.
