## THREE "FAVOURITE FLATCOATED RETRIEVERS" ...... JOAN MASON

The dictionary describes "favourite" as "a preferred person or thing or in sport, one expected to win", not easy to make choices looking back over some 35 years and I am deliberately not choosing from the dogs I have bred or owned. Well, I might see if the Editor will allow me to squeeze a tiny sentence at the end.

To start at the beginning, in the early 1960's, I had been looking into and following the breed for a couple of years without really getting much solid information; Flatcoated Retrievers were thin on the ground. I was looking for a good looking animal that would also make a competent rough shooting dog as my husband's Springer was getting on Then one day, I think at Coventry Gundog, we met Margaret Jay with Dewmist Lullaby. Rosemary fell in love on the spot which re-enforced the idea of having a Flatcoat and interestingly "Bonnie" carried some of the bloodlines I had already sussed out as being of interest, so I felt I was looking for the right type of Flatcoated Retriever even though "Bonnie" herself was not going to be bred from. As she was so much a part of our introduction to the Breed, she has to be my starting point.

Dewmist Lullaby was bred by Mrs. Baker, sired by Reg Vernon's Black Friar of Yarlaw from Claverdon Viceriene. Reg Vernon was head keeper on the Packington Estate. The litter was born on June 3<sup>rd</sup> 1963. "Bonnie" was a medium sized bitch, perhaps slightly larger than average. Splendid bone, very well constructed with balance and above all had a delightful calm and confident character. She was only shown lightly but was a useful picking up dog and had some success in Trials at that time. Somewhat fortuitously, when we eventually had our first Flatcoat, Heronsflight Black Bell of Yarlaw, she turned out to be very similar in type and had the same equable temperament.

Sh Ch Rungles Lady Barbara, bred and owned by the late Georgina Fletcher, more commonly known as "Fletch" and the late Tinker Davies. A superbly beautiful bitch with that touch of class, she gave the impression of power combined with a flowing elegant outline. Sired by Waterboy of Springon from the splendid bitch Ch Happy Wanderer who also produced Ch Rungles Wag, Sh Ch Sandylands Rungles Witch and Sh Ch Fredwell Rungles Happy Wendy. Don't be misled by the "Sh Ch" because, given the opportunity, these Rungles Flatcoats could train and work well.

Teal of Hawk's Nest. Stanley O'Neill mated his Pewcrot Peep to Captain Brian Farr's Gaff of Riverside. Strangely, O'Neill himself was not impressed by Teal as a pup and felt Captain Farr had chosen the wrong pup; history proved him wrong. Teal was possibly the most shot over Flatcoat in the country at that time (latish fifties into the sixties).

Teal's use at Stud was restricted by Captain Farr; he had to be confident that the bitch

was a good specimen and a proven competent worker in the Field. In consequence, I believe that Teal was only used five times in all, despite which the progeny and descendants from these matings have proved enormously influential in producing good looking dogs with inherent working ability. Teal must rank high amongst the most beneficially influential sires in the Breed over the past 40 or 50 years. I remember being so impressed by Dr. Laughton's "F" litter that I felt they had exactly what we need to look for, but felt there was not the remotest chance that Captain Farr would allow me to use Teal. However, thanks to the good offices of Dr. Laughton, Teal was used on Black Bell and again the issue was outstanding. Not only was he an immediately prepotent sire but his inherent working abilities were transmitted down through successive generations. Look at your pedigrees for proof.

The final sentence? My beloved Pansy of course......Joan Mason

#### GUIDELINES FOR THE LITTER RECORDING SERVICE

The Committee have decided to appoint a litter recorder for the Association. The new litter recorder is Mrs. Brenda Adams (tel. No. 01423 885471) whom we are sure is known to many of you. Please let her know if you are expecting a litter in order that she can put you on her list and help to match your puppies with new owners. The following points are general guidelines for using the service which we hope will be of use to breeders and those of you looking for a puppy alike.

- 1. Priority will be given to Members of the Association who have puppies available.
- 2. New owners should be given advice and support together with a copy of the Code of Ethics of the Association.
- 3. Vendors must undertake to make all reasonable enquiries regarding the prospective homes and their suitability. The Secretary or Committee Member cannot enquire indepth into each prospective home, they can only advise.
- 4. Vendors must realise that whilst the Association will help as much as possible it is unreasonable to expect puppies to be homed in large numbers on a regular basis. Vendors must make every effort to home puppies themselves, preferably not having litters until they have sufficient enquiries.

When a litter has been sold, please notify the Litter Recorder so that your name can be removed from the 'puppies available' list so preventing disappointment to prospective new owners.

#### OPEN SHOW - 15th NOVEMBER 1998

DOGS - Judge - Mr. Christian Sondergaard First of all a thank you very much for inviting me to judge such a good entry of dogs. My general impression was that the quality was good all over. Most of the heads were very good, not many broad skulls. Bites were correct, a few had a bit of rounded eyes that ruins expression. Eye colour was overall correct. Most bodies were well developed and the amount of bone adequate. I did not see the overdone bone that many breeders in Scandinavia unfortunately think is right.

The fronts were good and straight, but the shoulder angulation could be better in many. Nearly all dogs had the right moderate bend of stifle and hocks. Most coats were in good condition. My only sigh was that more people should work and exercise their dogs more to get a more muscular body and stronger moves.

My best dog and Best in Show was Heronsflight Herald to Torwood and all my best in classes had the muscular appearance I like.

Cl. 1 Minor Puppy Dog (9,1) - 1st Ladley's Eskmill Moonraker, Superb head and expression. Well built overall. A good sound mover. 2nd Kilminster's Cassblaid Dublin Whiskey of Withybed, Very nice liver, just not quite as developed as number one. 3" Whiskey of Withybed, very fine liver, just not quite to the whole of Daiksdale Cl. Wheeler's Wheelers Black Rain, Res. Keld's Rievaulx Ragged Robin of Daiksdale Cl. 2 Puppy Dog (5,1) - 1<sup>st</sup> C. Dublin Whiskey of W., 2<sup>nd</sup> Lewins' Torwood Mannerly, Good developed body for age, moved well, just preferred the head of number one. 3 Wakeham's Wizardwood Relkino. Res. Strathmore Water, 2nd Keld's Rievaulx Esk of Daiksdale, A good sound dog, would have liked a little more bone and stronger moves. Jan Morgan's Be Smart at Hillwolf, Res. Titterton's Gilduffe Owenreagh Cl. 5 Novice Dog (8,2) - 1st J. Strathmore Water, 2nd S. Gamekeeper, 3nd R. Moss Campion, Res. Whittaker's Bramatha Easter Egg Cl. 6 Graduate Dog (6,1) - 1st Moult's Capeldewi Merman, Good head and expression, well constructed except shoulder placement, moves okay. 2nd G. Owenreagh, Good body, nice head, a little loose in front moves. 3th B. Easter Egg, Res. Geoghegan's Hightarn Rambler Cl. 7 Post Graduate Dog (7,0) - 1st Malkin's Steeplehouse Ashe, A good sound dog all over, moves very well and with drive. 2<sup>nd</sup> Townsend's Steeplehouse Chipper, A good mover, but I would have preferred a little more bone and body. 3rd Hargreaves' Forgeway Park Royal, Res. Hightarn Rambler Cl. 8 Limit Dog (10,3) - 1st Jury's Heronsflight Herald to Torwood, Superb masculine head and expression, well constructed all over, muscular body, good movement, my best dog and best in show 2<sup>nd</sup> Hargreaves' Wolfhill Touch of Guinness, Liver dog not in best coat, head needs a little bit more refinement, moves well. 3<sup>nd</sup> Broadbent's Waverton Tom Collins, Res. Reserve Best in Show was Kilminster's Withybed Miss Montana, Best Puppy in Show, Watson's Here Comes the Rain. Best veteran in Show, Joyce's Stranfaer Murchessan.

Johnson's Deep River Walk of Downstream Cl. 13 - Puppy Bitch (10,2) - 1<sup>st</sup> Forster's Wizardwood Tawny Temptress 9 month old liver bitch, super head with a lovely dark eye and soft expression, good deep brisket and shoulder, well made throughout and moved okay, 2<sup>nd</sup> Brooks' Steelriver Mystic Rythms of Castlerock, another nice baby, good head, good bone, well bodied and moved okay, 3rd Jury's Torwood Chocolate Penny, Res. Black Vanilla, 2<sup>nd</sup> Newcombe's Maybrian Bellara, Nice bitch, good head, dark eye, level topline, excellent bend of stifle, moved well. 3<sup>rd</sup> Plane Joint Pal, Res. J. Sound of Isla Cl. 17 -Graduate Bitch (12,0) 1st Orme's Elmstock Midnight
