NEFRA Fun Day Woodford Memorial Hall Sunday 7th October 2001

Two members have submitted articles reporting on this event, both worthy of note, so with a little editing to fit the space available they are both included.

According to Audrey, our Secretary, 70 people, 65 dogs and 10 children had booked places, which, if everyone turned up and my memory serves me right (memory loss is beginning to creep in), would make it one of the best attended that we have ever held. The one thing that we were all looking at though was the weather; the experts had predicted a very wet and windy day, so the worry was what would we do with all those dogs and people crowded into one big hall. As it happened the worry was unfounded as the gods smiled down on us. The weather was fine, blue skies and sunshine, even if it was a bit wet underfoot on the field. All sorts of activities had been arranged, even if some of them were dropped on people at the last moment, sorry Denise and Gill. A police officer from Leicestershire was bringing his Flatcoat to give a talk and demonstration, scurry, agility, ringcraft, trimming and a dummy pick up competition were the order of the day plus a friendly competition between the dogs, (a match - shhhhhh...)

It was an early start for the committee, 8.30am, to get everything set up and organized for the hordes that were soon to arrive, chairs to put out, scurry to set up, oh and coffee to help us all wake up and put us on the right footing. Although we were scheduled for a 10.00am brew of coffee for a 10.30am start, our participants started arriving about 9.00am, and of course, the first thing was exercising the dogs on the field. By 10.00am, the majority of the people had arrived and there had been dogs galore all over the field. The only reason I mention that, is that the Police Dog demonstration was partly held on the field. Also by this time, the gallant ladies and gentleman were hard at work in the kitchen serving coffee and cakes and preparing lunch that was also being laid on for anybody who wished to buy it there. I would like to say at this point that those ladies and gentleman worked all day in the kitchen, only closing while the Police Dog demonstration and talk were on, their motto otherwise was 'We never close' So to the start of the proceedings. Peter, our chairman, welcomed everybody to the day and commented on the turnout. He then handed over to Steve Jubb, the M.C. for the day, (supposedly because, rumour has it, he could shout loudly,) who explained the itinery for the day. And so to the first item.

Pc Doug Marshall from Leicestershire Constabulary handles a Flatcoat for the Force and it had been trained to sniff out firearms, components of firearms and also drugs. He started off by telling how long he had been a dog-handler, how long



he had had his Flatcoat and explaining about the training of the dog. He also told us that four items had been hidden in the only being 0.3 gms of neron. The also told us that four neits had been hidden in the field, these being a shotgun cartridge, a revolver and 2 small cartridge cases. This talk lasted for about 20 mins and then he fetched 'Connor' in.

I don't know how many of you know Woodford Hall but there is a stage and a very large hall which could have easily sat about 150 – 200 people, so it is a fair size. He started off at the entrance to the hall and got Connor to start his search round there. Connor was not at all fazed by the people sitting in the hall but seemed to totally ignore them and got on with his work, unusual for a Flatcoat, knowing how friendly they can be. Pc Marshall guided him round the back of the hall and, within about five minutes, Connor had his first find, a small bag of cannabis in Pc Marshall's coat pocket, which he had left on the back of a chair at the rear of the hall. Connor was then given his head to try and find the next lot on his own. We had taken some rolled up mats for use during the day and these had been left near a fire exit at the front of the hall. Within another two minutes, Connor had also successfully recovered these. Pc Marshall then showed us the fingertip method of guiding Connor, whereby he shows Connor where to look, just by using his hands. There was no shouting, whistling or anything, other than encouragement and praise by the handler. Soon item number three was found under a cover on top of a radiator at the opposite side of the stage. So to item number four, which was the smallest of the articles. Hey presto, another two minutes and this was found in a crash helmet on the stage. Four - nil to the dog. Apparently the best find that Connor had made was two scrapings of cannabis which were down the back of a settee, situated in a three bed roomed house.

We were then invited outside to watch Connor try and find the shells. I think most people know the size of a shotgun cartridge and a revolver, but the other two items were brass cases about 1/2" across by 1" in length and had been fired about two days previously. Now I have already said that dogs had been all over the field and that it was wet underfoot, what I haven't said was that the grass was uncut, about four to five inches long and trampled down, surrounded on three sides by hedges and the car park on the fourth. So the search began. Three minutes later up came the shotgun cartridge, followed by the revolver after a further three minutes. This just left the two small cases. Undeterred, Connor went about his business with vigour and a happy wagging tail. Soon he gave the signs of having found something and sure enough, hidden under two or three stones, were the two cartridges. A very good thirty minutes of solid work by an excellent partnership. Due to time constraints, Pc Marshall was unable to answer questions straightaway but he stayed for the whole day and made himself available to anyone

there who may have wanted to ask questions. I personally think that he was the star of the day and I know that Connor took part in the afternoon competition and some of the other outside activities as well.

We then had different activities on-going for the rest of the morning. Our Acting Working Secretary, Denise, showed us her other side by taking a ringcraft session in the main hall. Gill Walker very kindly did some trimming sessions for owners in the smaller hall and Val and Den ran the scurry. I know for a fact that all three activities were very well attended and even over ran into our lunch hour. After lunch, two ladies, June and Jane from Wilmslow Dog Club, set up the agility outside so that people could put their dogs through their paces on the equipment, while Val and Den supervised a dummy picking up competition outside and a friendly competition was held in the hall, presided over by Kath Jubb (results elsewhere in the magazine.). Denise also held a puppy training session. The day was concluded at about 4.30pm with a few presentations. Fortunately the weather just about held out, although there were one or two slight showers, and it only really started to rain as the last few committee members were leaving.

Once again thanks to Kathryn, Claire, Sarah and Mark for sterling work in the kitchen, Kathryn providing nearly all the food. Also to Elaine for manning the 'shop', from what I could see she was kept very busy, and to Gary for a sterling job selling raffle tickets, Kath bringing home her normal quota of winnings. Mrs. Etheridge made copious amounts of cakes for sale in the kitchen and also donated a lovely cake which was raffled off, no guesses as to who won that, (see above), but it was sent to the kitchen to be cut up so everybody could have a piece. Mr. Bateson brought some intriguing cardboard boxes with him and when opened they contained small torches, complete with batteries, which again were donated and every participant was allowed to take one home with them. Many thanks to those two people. Last but by no means least, our thanks go to you, the members who attended the day, without you it would have been a complete flop, but you made it an excellent day, which, I hope, was enjoyed by all.

Because he knows through his training that when he finds drugs or firearms that he will get one of his favourite toys to play with (including a plastic bullet!!!). As Doug emphasised you can't make a dog do work like this it has to be reward based training. After a break for coffee and cake the 'have a go' sessions started, there was ring craft training, a trimming demonstration on your own dog, a scurry where you could choose to retrieve 1 or 2 dummies and gundog training to keep everyone busy. In the afternoon agility equipment (kindly loaned to NEFRA by Wilmslow DTC via June) was set up on the field and with the help of a WDTC member who was passing and offered to help, June put everyone through their paces. There was also a show match in the hall that people were encouraged to enter, and the now famous NEFRA dummy pick-up where you score points for dummies retrieved out an area of cover.

Everything went really well, everyone found something new to try as well as having a go at old favourites. We had some visitors too, a couple who used to have a Flatcoat and were passing came to see what was going on, and a family who have one dropped in. I had been to the NEFRA Open Shows several times as a visitor and always liked these shows because of the quiet, friendly and easygoing atmosphere. I felt very honored when I was asked two years ago to judge dogs at the 2001 NEFRA Open Show and of course I was very pleased with the number of entries. Thank you very much for entering your dogs under me!

I found temperament very good, and all dogs were very sure of themselves and friendly. I got so many licks on my ears and it is a little miracle that my flower survived the day, so many dogs wanted to nibble it!
In general, in the younger dog classes some lacked quality in head and several younger dogs did not have seissor bites and a few had rather flat feet.

In the higher classes the overall quality was much better. The winners in the higher classes were all very good typical Flatcoats. Limit Class especially had high quality exhibits wagging their tails as hard as possible to try to convince me to choose them!

My Best Dog, and later Best in Show, Steeplehouse Gamekeeper is a first class, absolutely smashing Flatcoat, in perfect condition who I feel sure has a bright show career ahead of him. Also the Reserve Best Dog, and later Reserve Best in Show, Ghilgrange Magic Magician JW is a lovely dog. The two dogs placed second after the winners, Hasweth Spirit in the Sky and Windyhollows Tumbling Ted JW did catch my eye, as did Billowen Magic at Midnight, winner of Post Grad. The best Veteran, Heronsflight Haste, moved as solid as a locomotive. But there can be only one Winner and that was Gamekeeper!

Jack is 13 weeks old, just finished his injections and has been away from his mother since he was 5/6 weeks old and away from his siblings since he was 7/8 weeks old. He has lived in the house with another Flatcoat and has learnt exactly how far he can go with any given game with the older dog.

Jack has his own bed, which is in a cage where he is put when we think he needs to rest (this is not always his opinion). If he falls asleep in the house, or the other dogs bed we usually remove him to continue his sleep in his cage.

At first he was fed in his cage so his older friend didn't bully him from his food, also as there was nothing to distract him in the cage the only thing left to do was eat. In his cage he learnt to be on his own, not destroy furniture or other things left lying around. He stayed in his cage when his older friend went on his longer walks and training sessions.

From being a tiny pup Jack would test his teeth and carry things. When we saw him carrying anything we would go down to his level and call him to us, when he came to show us his "find" we would scratch his chest thus making him hold his head up and sit down so laying the foundations for a good presentation. We sometimes eventually removed his "retrieve" other times we left him with it and occasionally we "exchanged" it for a little treat, always we kept our spare hand under the object so even if he opened his mouth he never dropped the object onto the ground. Jack became quite happy to bring anything he picked up to show us, came willingly to his name because he didn't feel his prize would be snatched

From the beginning when we prepared his food we told him to "sit" This he did easily if you held the dish up, then we praised his and either gave him the food or put it into his cage. We decided where he ate. On walking to the cage we tried to get him to walk sensibly by our side, not running round in front and so trip us up, or jump up and down and cause the dish to be knocked. Jack soon learnt "sit" expecting a treat, or food. "Stay" was introduced when sit had been thoroughly learnt. By 12 weeks he would sit and stay while his food was prepared and placed

for him to eat without mobbing you while you put it on the ground. There are 2 ways of looking at "sit" and "stay". Some say the fewer words a dog needs to learn the better he will be and to this end if he is told to "sit" he should remain sat until told to do otherwise. We've all heard about the old gamekeeper, on taking his dog to town left him sitting outside the shop and it wasn't till he got home and his wife asked him where was the dog? He remembered him, took the bus back to find the dog sitting patiently sitting outside the shop. O.K. for older dogs, but pups needs to be able to distinguish a longer term "stay" and a short

Before he was 12 weeks Jack was used to a slip lead, being quite happy to follow your hand for fuss and titbits, when a leader just happened to be round his neck.

At first he always got the treat but then it dropped off as his proficiency on the leader increased soon it was second nature to want to walk with you when the leader was round his neck, because you never knew what exciting places you might be going, and what exciting things you might be doing. By now Jack was ready to face the big world, he had a grounding in basic obedience and needed only to progress with his training to become a joy to have around and the pride of the household. Breed Specific Seminar, Kirk Deighton, Saturday 20th October 2001

Gundog Proficiency Certificate

The Gundog Proficiency Certificate is being introduced by the association to encourage the breeding in the North of England of good working retrievers, and to help prospective puppy purchasers choose pups, if they wish, whose parents have achieved a recorded level of competence in the shooting field and also assist the owners of bitches to choose a mate with a recorded level of competence in the shooting field. The scheme will be complementary to the Shooting Dog Certificate run so successfully by the Flatcoated Retriever Society and will be run on similar lines. Priority will be given to members of N.E.F.R.A.

It is important that we establish a test in which dogs can prove that they have inherent capabilities, being assessed more on their work than on handling, so we must try to test each dog on as similar lines as possible. Dogs will be required to be steady and quiet, to walk reasonably to heel and be under reasonable control at all times, retrieve tenderly to hand, both fur or feather, to pick game from cover and to enter water and swim. In this way we should be able to find a number of useful working dogs in our area that might not have been discovered.

To this end the first 'day' of this new venture will be run towards the end of January in the Newark - Mansfield area, Nottinghamshire. This will be held on a formal shoot and cost the participants £20. If there are more than 4 wishing to take part it can be arranged to hold another day before the end of the shooting season, perhaps in a different part of the N.E.F.R.A. area. So please let us know before 10^{10} January 2002 if you are at all interested so arrangements could be made to hold a day nearer to you if the demand is there
