I began judging Golden Retrievers in 1978 having previously owned Irish setters and with my wife June own the affix Pyngold. In 1990 I was approved by the Kennel Club to award Challenge Certificates in Golden Retrievers. I am widely recognised as a gundog specialist and I refuse to judge any breed outside the gundog group - but I will judge varieties and BIS at Open shows.

I am probably best known throughout the world of dogs as a Show Administrator. At one time I was a member of the Midland Counties, Birmingham National and City of Birmingham Championship Show Committee's at the same time. Since 1995 I have been Show Secretary of the City of Birmingham Championship Show and currently is also a Group Steward at the WELKS and LKA championship Shows. For some ten years I was Secretary of Solihull Canine Society running at that time one of the largest Open Shows in the area. I am a member of The Kennel Club and in 1997 was elected onto the General Committee. I also sit on the Show Executive Sub-Committee and the Disciplinary Sub-Committee. I was previously a member of the General & Group Championship Shows Council and a Gundog Delegate (representing Golden Retrievers) on the Kennel Club Liaison Breed Council. Within Golden Retrievers I am currently Vice -Chairman of the Midland GRC and was instrumental in forming the Golden Retriever Breed Council when I became their first Secretary. Later I became their Chairman a post that I have recently relinquished. I have judged gundogs extensively in many overseas countries, including Norway, Sweden, Finland, Switzerland, Germany, Holland and Malta to name a few.

This, as most of you will new know, is a set of tests devised for NEFRA members who have not trained dogs before and are not sure of the standard needed for Working Tests or who do not wish to compete against anything but a set standard. It also helps (when its been going a while) prospective purchasers of puppies to know what standard the parents etc have reached in a working capacity. To these aims your working Committee started out last year with the Novice tests. These four days were all fully subscribed which was heartening to the organisers and after four days twelve certificates were won by;

These are obviously in alphabetical order, dogs sitting on two passes, (who we hope will be able to make the new days) are Casanjay Wiliwaw, Meldorfer Mayfly & Steeplehouse Chase. There are quite a few on one pass and we are hoping to have days around the north to enable people to travel.

The twelve dogs and eight owners who now have the lovely certificates designed by Keith Aldred, we hope will go onto the intermediate tests, which are being held throughout next year. The first Novice test for next year starts with one being held at Dorothy Brooks, Wild Acres, Sandy Lane, Whirley, Macclesfield. On 26th January. Entries as usual to me. Cost still held at £3 per dog. The second day is at

Farnsfield on the 23rd February with the third day on 21st September at the Thornton's, Coventry Fm, Whitters Lane, Winmarleigh, Garstang, Preston. Other Novice test days may be put on in conjunction with the Intermediate tests. It all depends on demand etc. The first Working Test will be held at Coventry Farm on the 5th April (Nr Preston). This will be for members only unless under subscribed. The second WT will be held at Farnsfield on the 7th September. We will try a Cold Game Test again this year. It will be in sugar beat at Lincoln on 5th October. (same farm complex as this year but a different area of the farm.) We are still trying to arrange a seminar 'An introduction to working your Flatcoat' for February and this may unavoidably clash with the Novice Training Day. Keep in touch if you are interested in either. The seminar is basically without dogs so people can concentrate on the talk and not be distracted by an untrained dog. I hope everyone will find something to do over the coming year with his or her Flatcoat. It is very difficult finding venues and dates for activities and gelling the two is nearly impossible, so hope to see you all at some of the events.

Directional work with Guy

We now have a puppy that will retrieve from in front of you on the word 'Back' but now we need to go left or right. This is easily explained but takes longer in practise hence the winter issue for wagging tails gives you more time to perfect the manoeuvre before the spring W.T. start. Start with a puppy dummy and your pup and set off forward to heel for a few paces. Sit the dog and throw the dummy forward a short distance. Leave the pup in a sit and turn to your right and walk a short distance (about5-10 yards to start with) then turn round to face your pup and settle yourself. With a wide sweep of your arm starting with your right hand on your chest fling your arm to the right and say clearly and firmly "Get on". The pup will, with any luck look towards the direction of your hand and see and remember the dummy you threw earlier and rush off to retrieve it and return it to you. If he does not go, try to be more positive with your body movements towards the right. Keep the distances small to start with until he has the idea very firmly in his head. Then you can try lengthening the distance you throw the dummy and also alter the distance you walk away before you send the dog. When the right hand signal is learnt. Repeat the same procedure for the left this time after throwing the dummy in front turn the dog to the left then leave the dog once again in a sit and you walk to the left and direct the dog with your left hand.

When left and right are solidly learnt you can reduce the size of the arm movements to those of the professionals who with a mere twitch of their hand can direct a dog not only left and right but also in a 1,4 8 & 11 o'clock direction

Boar Shooting in Germany.

Thank goodness for 'airflight.com', which enables us to travel very, very cheaply, from this end David & I jetted away to Germany to stay with a friend (with Flatcoats) to help Bizmark to shoot his Boar. We arrived a day early to help us acclimatize. They are only an hour ahead of us and this was easily lost in travelling. So Friday dawned, well it hadn't really dawned, when we got up to dress suitably for a beating and shooting day in heavy forest. The weather was such that Friday never really dawned; it stayed very grey, dull and misty all day. The forest where the pigs live is dense, real Hansel & Gretal stuff, and the mist swirling round the tops of the pine trees was really beautiful and yet again eerie, every sound was muffled but the beauty was incredible with raindrops hanging from all the branches and the occasional sound coming out of the forest.

We set off and picked up more of the party on the half an hour journey to the estate and the keepers house. On reaching the outskirts of the Boar park we waited and met up with other cars before passing through the heavy iron gates. The pigs are kept in by stout fencing (iron) because people never stopped telling me how dangerous they could be. At Gustaffs house we all met up (about sixty beaters and other helpers). There were people from every country, fortunately most of them spoke English, and every one wanted to come over to England for shooting pheasants etc. It is not common to shoot pheasants in Europe. We met people who knew all our friends in other countries which only goes to show what a close knit community the shooting fraternity is.

The main party of shooters arrived and picked up, lesser mortals conferred with Gustaff and off we went. There are no dogs bigger than Jack Russell sized terriers used. They are used to harass the pigs if they won't run and also to contain them if they are wounded until a person can dispatch the pig quickly. Large dogs, pointer and HPR size were banned when the deaths became too great from pig attacks. The forest floor is so littered with fallen branches and the pigs, when angry, are so fast that the bigger dogs cannot get away easily or move quickly enough.

The day passed without incidence and by lunch only thirty pigs had been shot, so on into the afternoon, by evening the bag was respectable and by the end of the second day nearly two hundred pigs and a few deer had been shot. By that time the big guns retired to Bizmarks house and the lesser guns and helpers to Gustaffs house where there is a large community hall for the workers use. Here drink and food was being given out. As I got there the butchers were already cleaning the bag out (gutting etc) and there were five big braziers lit with flares between them. In the middle the pigs were all laid out (deer as well) in order of size. We all gathered round, and ten horns announced, with quite a musical piece the guns arrival and the host started proceedings with a speech thanking everyone (weather gods, state of the forest, pigs, for giving their lives, ancestors, for putting them in the position to have such sport, helpers, in fact everything was covered including his blood group I think) Then he proceeded to each corner and called on the spirits of the pigs & the forest to thank them for allowing such sport now & in the future, then back to the beginning where the person who shot the most pigs was honoured as "King" for the night this year it was Leopold Bizmarks brother so it was OK as it kept it in the family. Then the person who despatched the most pigs was honoured and given the pigs tails and became "King" of the beaters party that

When the big party left everyone looked over the pigs and went over to the hall for the night's festivities. These started when the field had been cleared, the pigs hung up and fires made safe. All the food, drink and entertainment had been provided by Bizmark and the hall, which was wooden with a thatched roof and decorated with skulls and heads of prestigious animals who had been shot was lit by candles in deer antler holders with a super central chandelier made up of quite a few large antlers. The eating and drinking was merry at first but when alcohol began to take over the party of nearly 100 began to disperse, back through the iron gate and into the fog to wait for the next Boar shoot.
